Student Learning Outcome 1

(knowledge, skill or ability to be assessed)

Students will apply knowledge of healthcare accounting and finance principles and utilize an appropriate methodology to analyze data and present results in a clear, professional written document

Effectiveness Measure: Identify the data collection instrument, e.g., exam, project, paper, etc. that will be used to gauge acquisition of this student learning outcome and explain how it assesses the desired knowledge, skill or ability. A copy of the data collection instrument and all scoring rubrics associated with this student learning outcome are to be attached to the plan.

Students will complete a data analysis project in the HSMT 3203 Introduction to Health Care Accounting and Finance. The assignment will assess students' ability to interpret and communicate analytical and financial records to professional peers. Students will be assessed on their analysis skills via the AAC&U Inquiry and Analysis Value Rubric

Student Learning Outcome 2

Students will complete a written Health Care Team proposal in HSMT 4101 Health Systems Organization Development. This assignment will assess the students’ ability to communicate professionally and allow them to demonstrate their ability to utilize a shared vision with culturally relevant perspectives by their completion of the written assignment. The rubric dimension measuring teamwork will be completed by each member of the team for the other team members to provide a measure of leadership skills modeled during the completion of the assignment. A hybrid rubric to assess values, teamwork, and written communication will be utilized to assess the project.

Student Learning Outcome 3

Students will demonstrate professional oral communication skills presenting evidence of their ability to address organizational needs of the health and human services sector utilizing an interdisciplinary approach.

Students will develop and present an e-portfolio in HSMT 4400 Health Systems Management Capstone. Students will be assessed via a hybrid rubric to address the domains of communication and integrative learning. The presentation of the e-portfolio will require students to demonstrate the ability to address organizational needs using an interdisciplinary approach through the presentation of the artifacts in their portfolio. The presentation will give students the opportunity to demonstrate effective, professional oral communication skills.
